

Supergroup 2 – London Suburbs (4.2% of the UK population)

The members of this supergroup are concentrated in Outer London. This supergroup comprises of only one group which contains two subgroups. Enfield is the most typical health area in this supergroup and Waltham Forest is the least typical. In this supergroup:

The only variable with a proportion far below the national average is the percentage of women who work part-time.¹

The variables with a proportion close to the national average are²:

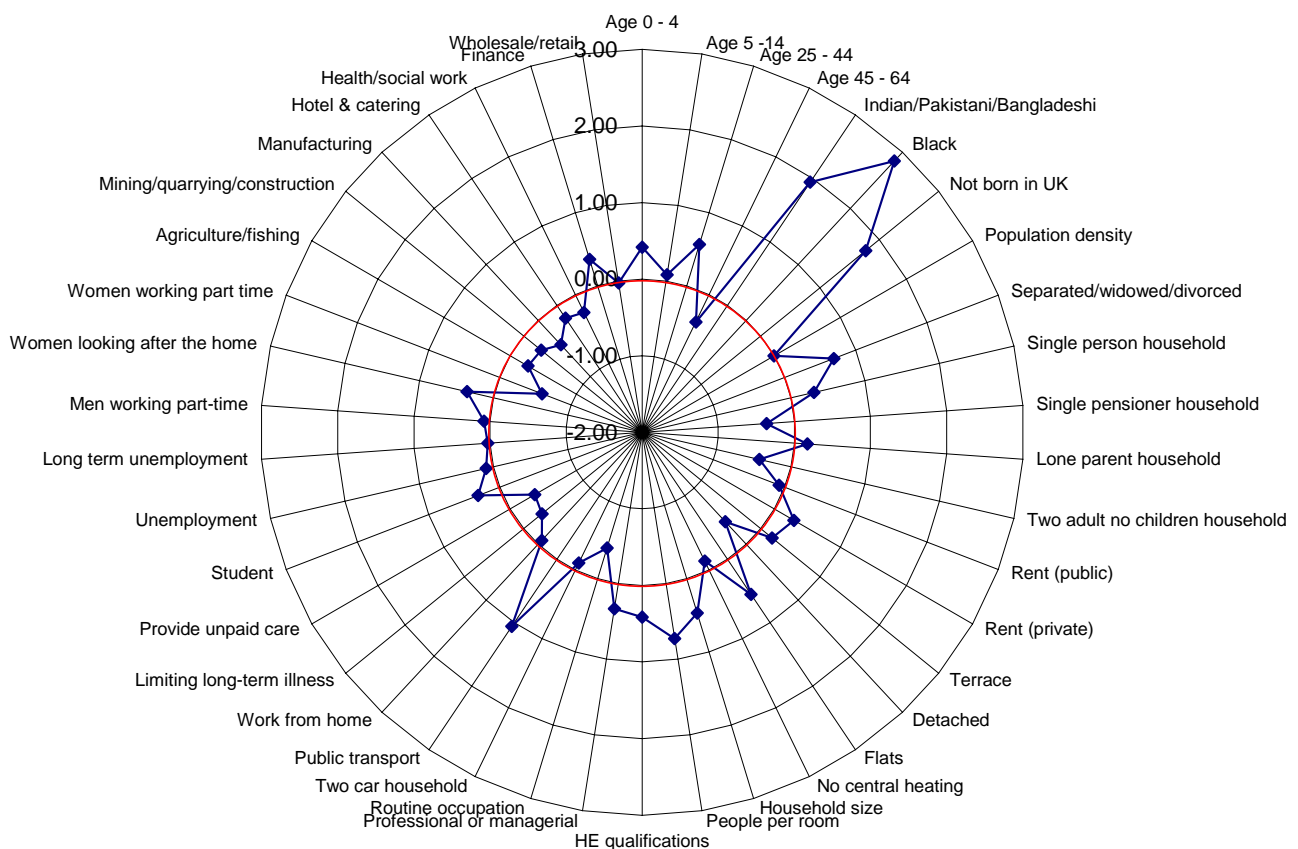
- Population density
- People who are long-term unemployed
- People who work in the wholesale or retail trades.

The variables with a proportion far above the national average are:³

- People aged between 25 and 44
- People who identify themselves as Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or Other Asian
- People who identify themselves as Black African, Black Caribbean or Other Black
- People who were not born in the United Kingdom
- People who are separated, widowed or divorced
- People who live in flats
- Average number of people per room
- People who take public transport to work.

London Suburbs

Range-standardised difference from the **UK mean**. Positive values show an above average level of the population and negative values show a below average level of the population



1. For a variable to be 'far below average' it must have a difference of more than 0.5 below the UK mean.
2. For a variable to be 'close to the average' it must have a difference of less than 0.05 above or below the UK mean.
3. For a variable to be 'far above average' it must have a difference of more than 0.5 above the UK mean.

Group 2.4 – London Suburbs (4.2% of the UK population)

The members of this group are concentrated in Outer London. This group is the only one in its supergroup, so it shares the same characteristics as the supergroup. Enfield is the most typical health area in this group and Waltham Forest is the least typical. In this group:

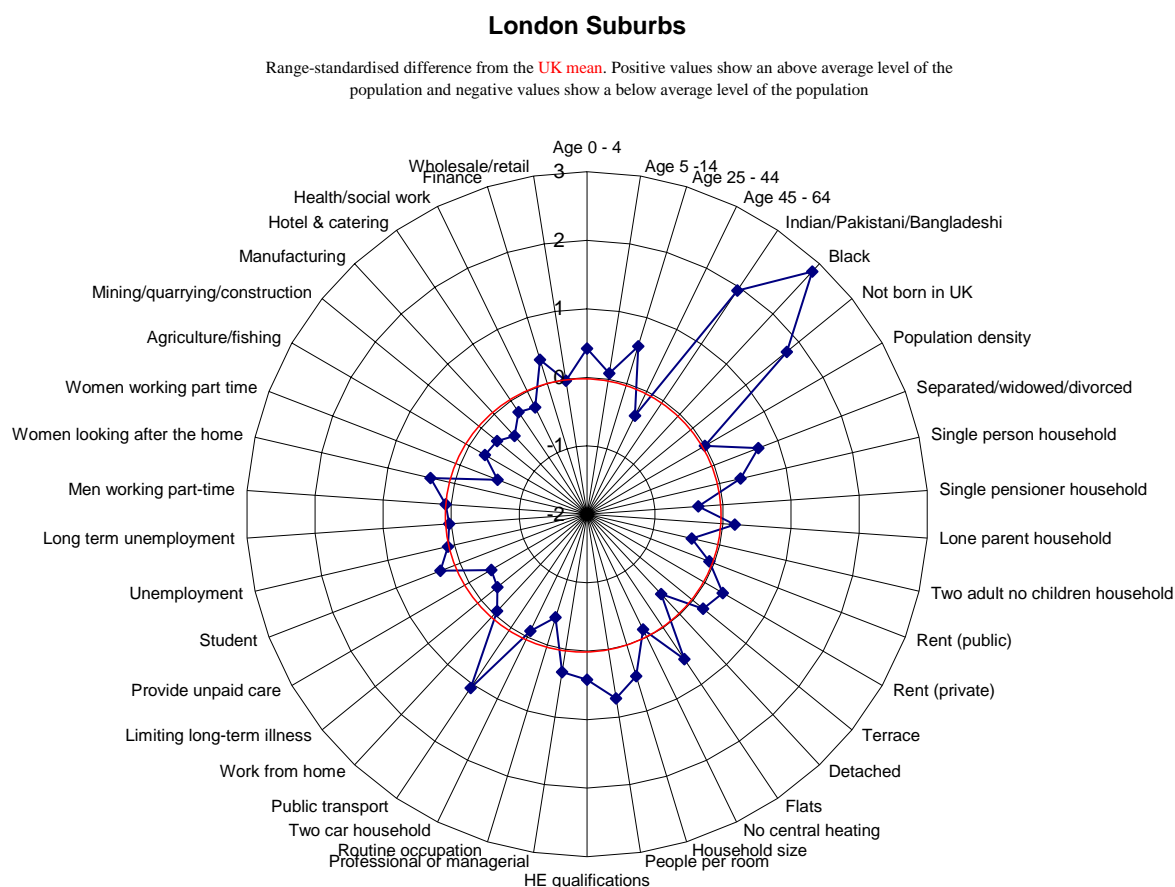
The only variable with a proportion far below the national average is the percentage of women who work part-time.¹

The variables with a proportion close to the national average are²:

- Population density
- People who are long-term unemployed
- People who work in the wholesale or retail trades.

The variables with a proportion far above the national average are:³

- People aged between 25 and 44
- People who identify themselves as Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or Other Asian
- People who identify themselves as Black African, Black Caribbean or Other Black
- People who were not born in the United Kingdom
- People who are separated, widowed or divorced
- People who live in flats
- Average number of people per room
- People who take public transport to work.



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Subgroup 2.4.6 – London Suburbs - A (2.5% of the UK population)

The members of this subgroup are concentrated in Outer London. Redbridge is the most typical health area in this subgroup and Luton is the least typical. In this subgroup:

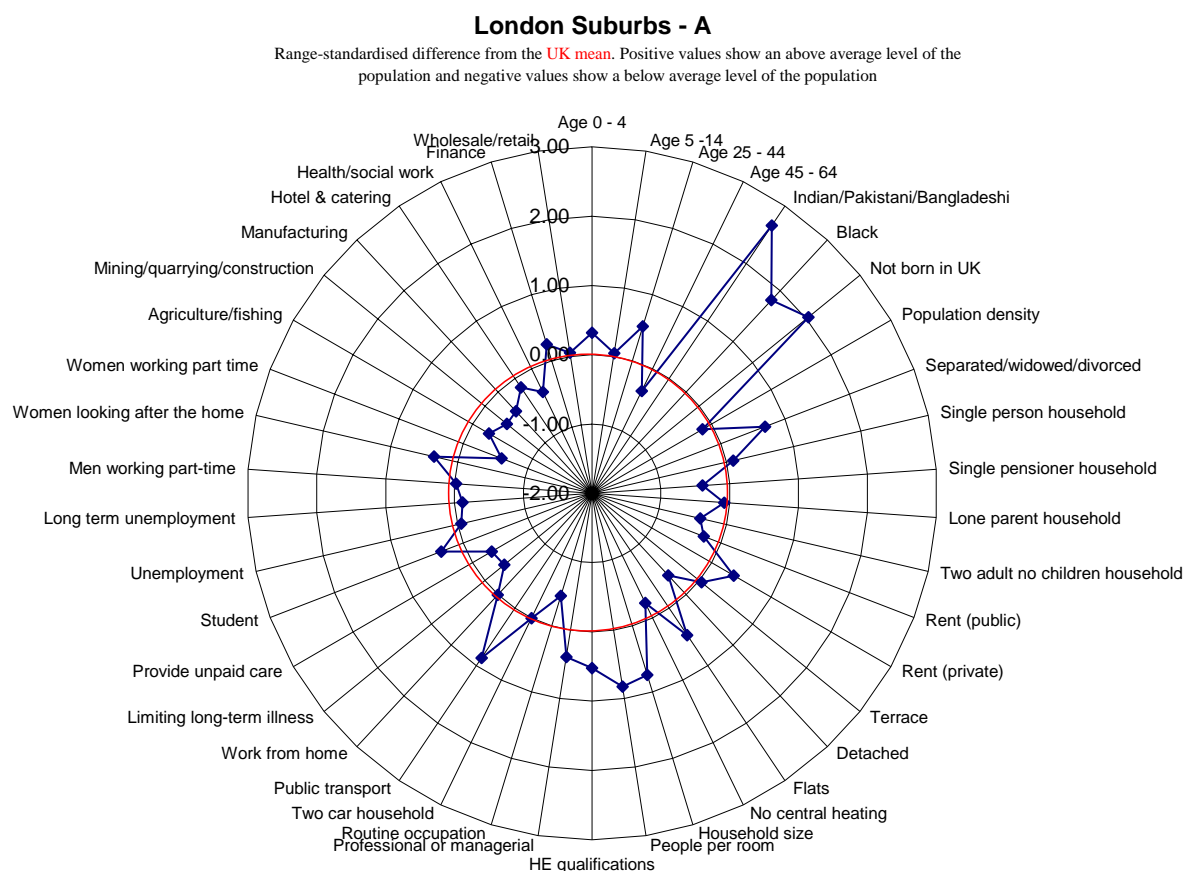
The only variable with a proportion far below the national average is the percentage of women who work part-time.¹

The variables with a proportion close to the national average are²:

- People aged between 5 and 14
- People who live in a terraced house
- People who live in a two car household
- People who work from home
- Men who work part-time.

The variables with a proportion far above the national average are:³

- People aged between 25 and 44
- People who identify themselves as Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or Other Asian
- People who identify themselves as Black African, Black Caribbean or Other Black
- People who were not born in the United Kingdom
- People who are not living in a couple and are separated, widowed or divorced
- Average household size
- Average number of people per room
- People with a higher education qualification
- People who take public transport to work.



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Subgroup 2.4.7 – London Suburbs - B (1.8% of the UK population)

The members of this subgroup are concentrated in Outer London. Croydon is the most typical health area in this subgroup and Waltham Forest is the least typical. In this subgroup:

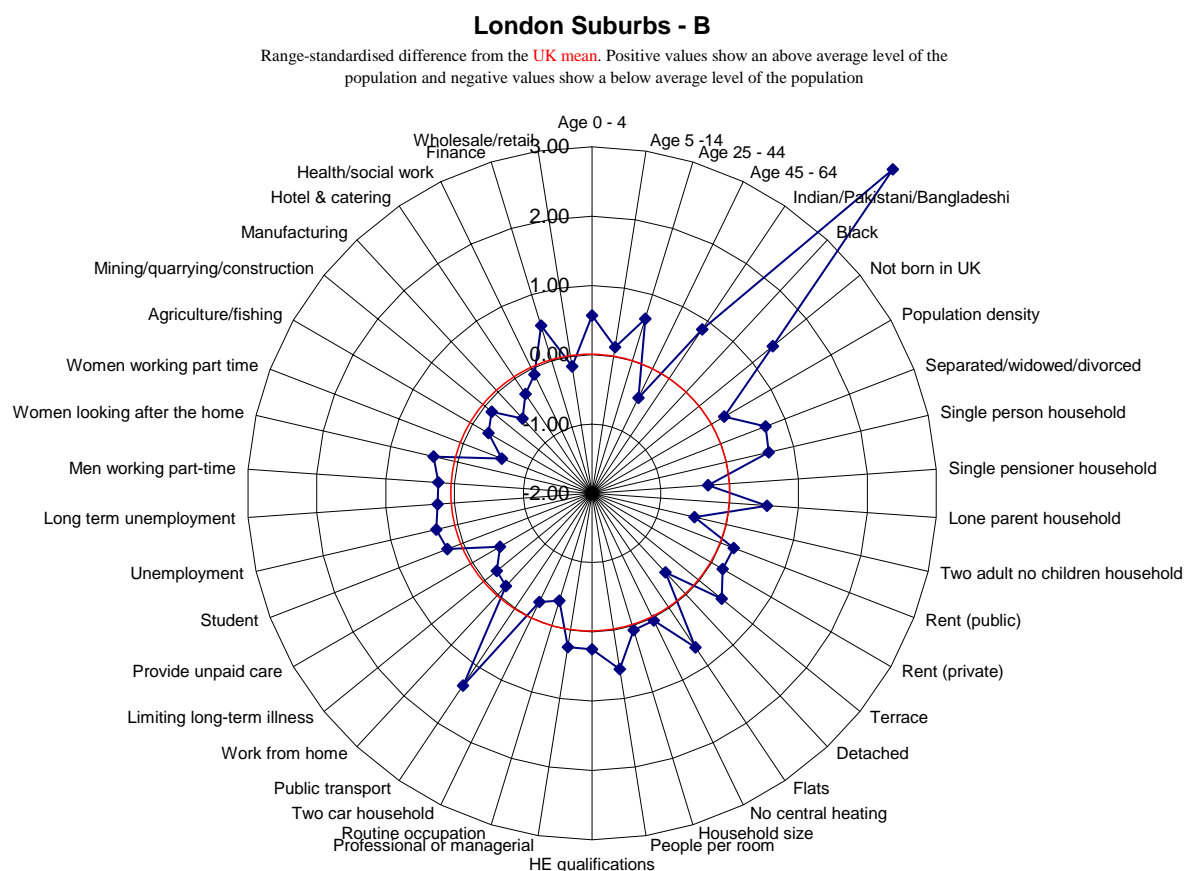
The variables with a proportion far below the national average are:¹

- Women who work part-time
- People who work in manufacturing.

The only variable with a proportion close to the national average² is people without central heating.

The variables with a proportion far above the national average are:³

- Children aged four or under
- People aged between 25 and 44
- People who identify themselves as Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or Other Asian
- People who identify themselves as Black African, Black Caribbean or Other Black
- People who were not born in the United Kingdom
- People who are separated, widowed or divorced
- People who live alone who are not pensioners
- People who live in lone parent households
- People who live in flats
- Average number of people per room
- People who take public transport to work
- People who work in financial intermediation.



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
