### **REVISED RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PARLIAMENTARY CONSTITUENCY BOUNDARIES IN THE COUNTY OF CUMBRIA**

**The Commission are to publish revised recommendations on 28 June 2001 for the following parliamentary constituencies in the county of Cumbria:-**

**Barrow and Furness CC  
Copeland CC  
Penrith and The Border CC  
Workington CC**

**The revised recommendations take account of the recommendations contained in the report submitted to the Commission by Mrs Suzan P Matthews QC, the Assistant Commissioner, who considered the written representations made to the Commission and the views expressed at the recent public inquiry.**

**The Commission are proposing no further changes to the following constituencies and, today, confirm their provisional recommendations as their final recommendations for:-**

**Carlisle BC  
Westmorland and Lonsdale CC**

1. The Boundary Commission are to publish revised recommendations for four parliamentary constituencies in the County of Cumbria on 28 June 2001. The Commission published their provisional recommendations for the county on 6 July 2000.

2. Objections to the proposals led to a public inquiry that was held in Carlisle on 16, 17 and 18 January 2001. The Assistant Commissioner who conducted the inquiry has recommended changes to the Commission's proposals. Having considered her report and recommendations, and the evidence submitted, the Commission have decided to adopt her proposed changes to the boundaries of four seats and to revise their proposals accordingly. The Commission have decided not to adopt her proposed change to the designation of the Carlisle seat.

## **Assistant Commissioner's Report**

3. Four counter-proposals were received and discussed at the inquiry. The main issues raised in the counter-proposals were:-

- (a) the Commission's proposals in respect of the South Lakeland wards of Broughton and Crake Valley;
- (b) the Commission's proposals in respect of the City of Carlisle wards of Wetheral, Stanwix Rural, and Stanwix Urban;
- (c) the Commission's proposals in respect of the Allerdale Borough wards of Clifton, Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, Harrington, and Keswick; and
- (d) the Commission's proposals in respect of the Allerdale Borough wards of Boltons, Marsh, Wampool, Waver, and Wigton.

The following issues were also raised either in the counter-proposals or at the inquiry:-

- (e) to transfer the Longtown & Rockcliffe, and Lyne wards of the City of Carlisle from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Carlisle seat;
- (f) to transfer the Dalston ward of the City of Carlisle from the Carlisle seat to the Penrith and The Border seat;
- (g) to transfer the Warnell ward of Allerdale Borough from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Workington seat;
- (h) to transfer the Sedbergh ward of South Lakeland District from the Westmorland and Lonsdale seat to the Penrith and The Border seat;
- (i) the creation of one urban seat comprising Workington and Whitehaven, and one rural seat comprising the rural wards of the Allerdale and Copeland boroughs; and
- (j) that Carlisle Borough Constituency should be re-designated as Carlisle County Constituency.

### **Broughton and Crake Valley wards**

4. The Commission proposed that the Broughton ward be transferred from the Westmorland and Lonsdale seat to the Copeland seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that there was significant local opposition to, and no support for, the ward being included in the Copeland seat. She saw no evidence of any affinity between the ward and Copeland, but considered that there were clear links between the ward and the Barrow and Furness seat. She accordingly recommended that the Broughton ward be included in the Barrow and Furness seat.

5. The Crake Valley ward is currently divided between the Barrow and Furness and Westmorland and Lonsdale seats. The Commission proposed that the whole of the ward be included in the Barrow and Furness seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that there was both support for, and opposition to, the Commission's proposal for the ward. She considered that the electorate of the Westmorland and Lonsdale seat was too high and that the ward has ties with the Barrow and Furness seat. She accordingly supported the Commission's proposal that the Crake Valley ward should be wholly included in the Barrow and Furness seat.

#### **Wetheral, Stanwix Rural, and Stanwix Urban wards**

6. The Commission proposed that the Wetheral ward be transferred from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Carlisle seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that there was more support than opposition for the ward to be included in the Carlisle seat. She further reported that the ward has similarities with the Dalston ward that was included in the Carlisle seat at the last review. From the evidence put forward, she considered that Wetheral has close links with Carlisle in terms of employment, education, provisions, entertainment and road and rail transport. She considered that Wetheral was separated from the rural communities to the east by the natural boundary of the River Eden and that the M6 motorway was no longer a barrier between the ward and Carlisle. She accordingly supported the Commission's proposal that the Wetheral ward should be included in the Carlisle seat.

7. The Assistant Commissioner considered the evidence presented in support of a counter-proposal that the Stanwix Rural ward should be transferred from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Carlisle seat. However, she considered that the Commission's proposal to transfer the Wetheral ward to the Carlisle seat would increase the seat's electorate sufficiently and reported that if, in addition, the Stanwix Rural ward was transferred to the Carlisle seat, it would take the electorate of the seat further from the county average. She recognised that to transfer the Stanwix Rural ward to the Carlisle seat would benefit the Penrith and The Border seat, but felt that the benefit to that seat could be found elsewhere. She therefore rejected the counter-proposal.

8. The Stanwix Urban ward is currently divided between the Carlisle and the Penrith and The Border seats. The Commission proposed that the whole of the ward be included in the Carlisle seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that there was unanimous support for the Commission's proposal and accordingly agreed that the Stanwix Urban ward be included in the Carlisle seat.

#### **Clifton, Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, Harrington, and Keswick wards**

9. The Commission proposed that the Clifton, Dalton and Harrington wards be transferred from the Workington seat to the Copeland seat in order to increase the very low electorate of the latter seat. The Assistant Commissioner considered and rejected a counter-proposal that the Copeland seat should remain unaltered because of the unacceptably low electorate that would result.

10. The Assistant Commissioner reported that there was strong opposition to the Commission's proposal, particularly in respect of the Clifton and Harrington wards. From the evidence submitted about local ties, she considered that the three wards have close links with the town of Workington,

although the evidence indicated that Dalton's links with Workington were weaker and that the ward also had close links with the other neighbouring Allerdale Borough wards.

11. The Assistant Commissioner also reported that a counter-proposal was made for the transfer of the Dalton ward (together with the Crummock, Derwent Valley, and Keswick wards) from the Workington seat to the Copeland seat. She endorsed the Commission's proposal that the Dalton ward be included in the Copeland seat (see next paragraph), but recommended that the Clifton and Harrington wards should remain in the Workington seat.

12. The Assistant Commissioner considered the evidence presented in respect of the counter-proposal that the wards of Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, and Keswick should be transferred from the Workington seat to the Copeland seat. She found force in the argument presented that these wards were the most appropriate to transfer as they shared a degree of common interest with Copeland. She reported that the Crummock, Dalton, and Derwent Valley wards were contiguous with Copeland and considered they had more in common with Copeland than with Workington. She also reported that the Keswick ward had strong links with Whitehaven. She reported evidence that Dalton was the link between Keswick and Whitehaven and that its inclusion as part of the same constituency would be essential. She accepted the arguments made in support of the counter-proposal and accordingly recommended the transfer of the Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, and Keswick wards from the Workington seat to the Copeland seat.

#### **Boltons, Marsh, Wampool, Waver, and Wigton wards**

13. The Commission proposed that the Boltons ward be transferred from the Workington seat to the Penrith and The Border seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that whilst there was little support for the transfer there was also negligible opposition. She considered that, when taking account of her other recommendations for the two seats, the transfer was unnecessary. She accordingly recommended that the Boltons ward should remain in the Workington seat.

14. The Commission proposed that the Marsh and Wampool wards be transferred from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Workington seat. The Assistant Commissioner found little evidence in the counter-proposed argument that Marsh and Wampool have a stronger association with the Penrith and The Border seat than with the Workington seat. She felt they linked naturally together and have much more in common with the rural hinterlands of Silloth, Solway, and Holme. She accordingly supported the Commission's proposal that the Marsh and Wampool wards should be included in the Workington seat.

15. The Waver ward is currently divided between the Penrith and The Border and Workington seats. The Commission proposed that the whole of the ward be included in the Workington seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that the proposal had substantial support. She considered that including it in the Penrith and The Border seat would make the electorate of the seat too large. She accordingly supported the Commission's proposal that the Waver ward should be included in the Workington seat.

16. The Commission proposed that the Wigton ward be transferred from the Penrith and The Border seat to the Workington seat. The Assistant Commissioner reported that the transfer was widely opposed. She also reported that the Penrith and The Border seat was made up of market towns with Penrith and Wigton being the largest and with similar characteristics. She further reported that the Wigton ward had good road links with the Penrith and The Border seat and historically the

ward has been in that seat. She accordingly rejected the Commission's proposal and recommended that the Wigton ward should remain in the Penrith and The Border seat.

### **Other issues**

17. The Assistant Commissioner considered that the other issues listed at paragraphs 3(e) to 3(i) on page 2, which were raised in connection with two of the counter-proposals, lacked support and accordingly rejected them. In respect of the issue listed at paragraph 3(j), concerning the designation of the Carlisle seat, she recommended that the designation of the seat be changed from Borough Constituency to County Constituency. She noted that this change would mean all six seats in Cumbria would be designated as county constituencies, reflecting the very large size of the county and the urban and rural mix of all six seats.

### **Revised Recommendations**

18. The Commission considered the Assistant Commissioner's report, the transcript of the inquiry, the written representations and they reviewed the evidence area by area. They agreed with all but one of the Assistant Commissioner's recommendations.

19. The Commission accepted the Assistant Commissioner's recommendation that the Broughton ward would be better placed in the Barrow and Furness seat, despite the resulting shape of the seat. They noted the evidence and support for their proposals in relation to the wards of Crake Valley, Wetheral, Stanwix Urban, Dalton, Marsh, Wampool, and Waver and accepted her recommendations in respect of these wards. They also noted, and agreed, that accepting her recommendations meant that there was no need for the Boltons ward to be transferred, as they had proposed, or for the Stanwix Rural ward to be transferred, as had been counter-proposed. They also noted the evidence about, and the widespread opposition to, their proposal for the Wigton ward and accepted her rejection of their proposal.

20. The Commission considered their proposal to increase the electorate of the Copeland seat by including the Clifton, Dalton, and Harrington wards, the counter-proposal to increase the electorate by including the Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, and Keswick wards, and the counter-proposal to leave the existing seat unaltered. They noted that the Assistant Commissioner had agreed with their provisional decision that the electorate of the Copeland seat was now too low to be left unaltered. They agreed fully with her view that the severity of the electoral disparity and the geographical difficulties of the area could be better balanced and that the geographical circumstances were not so extreme as to justify the continuation of such a substantial disparity. They noted the evidence reported by the Assistant Commissioner and agreed to accept the counter-proposal to transfer the Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, and Keswick wards from the Workington seat to the Copeland seat as a better option than their provisional recommendations.

21. In respect of the issues at paragraphs 3(e) to 3(i) above, the Commission agreed with the Assistant Commissioner that the counter-proposals lacked support. They also considered that the counter-proposals would create excessive disruption for little or no gain, and accordingly rejected them.

22. The Commission decided not to accept the Assistant Commissioner's recommendation to change the designation of the Carlisle seat from borough constituency to county constituency. They noted that the proposal had been made on the last day of the inquiry in connection with the counter-

proposal to include the Stanwix Rural ward in the Carlisle seat that had been rejected. The Carlisle seat as proposed contained predominately urban wards and the three rural wards totalled only 8,791 electors out of a total electorate of 63,001.

### **Composition of Constituencies**

23. No change is proposed to the names or composition of the following provisionally recommended constituencies (2000 electorates in brackets) and no further representations will be considered:-

#### **CARLISLE BOROUGH CONSTITUENCY (63,001)**

#### **WESTMORLAND AND LONSDALE COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (67,303)**

24. No change is proposed to the names of the revised constituencies. The composition of the revised constituencies would be (2000 electorates in brackets):-

**BARROW AND FURNESS COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (69,142).** The Borough of **Barrow-in-Furness**; and nine wards of the District of **South Lakeland**:- Broughton, Crake Valley, Low Furness & Swarthmoor, Ulverston Central, Ulverston East, Ulverston North, Ulverston South, Ulverston Town, Ulverston West.

**COPELAND COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (62,517).** Four wards of the Borough of **Allerdale**:- Crummock, Dalton, Derwent Valley, Keswick; and the Borough of **Copeland**.

**PENRITH AND THE BORDER COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (61,000).** Two wards of the Borough of **Allerdale**:- Warnell, Wigton; seven wards of the City of **Carlisle**:- Brampton, Great Corby and Geltsdale, Hayton, Irthing, Longtown & Rockcliffe, Lyne, Stanwix Rural; and the District of **Eden**.

**WORKINGTON COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (61,369).** Twenty-five wards of the Borough of **Allerdale**:- All Saints, Aspatria, Boltons, Broughton St Bridget's, Christchurch, Clifton, Ellen, Ellenborough, Ewanrigg, Flimby, Harrington, Holme, Marsh, Moorclose, Moss Bay, Netherhall, St John's, St Michael's, Seaton, Silloth, Solway, Stainburn, Wampool, Waver, Wharrels.

### **Outline map**

25. An outline map (please note the Crown Copyright warning on page 9) showing the Commission's proposals is attached to this news release together with a list of all the wards in the county and their 2000 electorates which the Commission are required to use. The letters and numbers on the outline map relate to the districts and wards in the list.

### **Publication of Revised Recommendations**

26. The revised recommendations will be published formally in a notice appearing in local newspapers in Cumbria on 28 June 2001. ## Representation Period: 28 June 2001 to 28 July 2001

28. As with their provisional recommendations, the Commission are statutorily required to consider representations about their revised recommendations within one month of local publication on 28 June 2001. Therefore, the representation period will end on 28 July 2001.

29. Representations about the revised recommendations for the four constituencies affected should be addressed to the Boundary Commission for England, PO Box 31060, London, SW1V 2FF, or faxed to 020 7533 5176, or emailed to [chris.ault@ons.gov.uk](mailto:chris.ault@ons.gov.uk). All representations received by the Commission will be acknowledged. It should be noted that the Commission are not statutorily required to hold second inquiries into representations about their revised recommendations.

30. The Commission are also not required to consider any representations made after 28 July 2001, but will endeavour to take late representations into account. However, the later the representation is made, the more difficult this will be. The Commission therefore encourage that all representations be made within the statutory one month period. Those who make representations are requested to say whether they approve of, or object to, the Commission's revised recommendations and to give their reasons for their approval or objection.

31. The Commission wish to stress that their recommendations relate solely to parliamentary constituencies and do not affect county, district or parish boundaries, taxes or services. The Commission will therefore not take account of any representation made about those local issues.

### **Background Note**

32. The Commission are constituted under Schedule 1 to the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986. The ex officio Chairman is the Speaker of the House of Commons. The Deputy Chairman, who presides over Commission meetings, is a High Court Judge appointed by the Lord Chancellor. The other two Commissioners are appointed by the Home Secretary and the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and the Regions. The two Assessors to the Commission are the Registrar General of England and Wales and the Director General of Ordnance Survey. Assistant Commissioners are lawyers appointed by the Home Secretary to conduct local inquiries.

33. The Commission are required by the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986 as amended by the Boundary Commissions Act 1992 to conduct a general review of all the constituencies in England every eight to twelve years. The Commission completed their previous general review on 12 April 1995 and must therefore complete the current review after 11 April 2003 and before 12 April 2007.

34. The general review started formally with the publication of a notice in the London Gazette on 17 February 2000. The Commission's recommendations throughout the review must by law be based on the numbers of electors on the electoral registers on that date.

### **Rules**

35. In recommending new constituencies, the Commission are required to give effect to the Rules for Redistribution of Seats which are contained in Schedule 2 to the 1986 Act.

36. Rule 1 places a limit on the total number of constituencies. Rule 2 requires single member constituencies. Rule 3 relates to the City of London. Rule 4 states that county and London borough boundaries are to be followed so far as is practicable. Rule 5 states that the electorates of constituencies are to be as nearly equal as practicable. Rule 6 allows the Commission to depart from rules 4 and 5 if special geographical considerations make a departure desirable. Rule 7 allows the Commission to depart from other rules; and requires them to take account of inconveniences caused or local ties broken by changes to constituencies. Rule 8 defines the electoral quota as the total number of parliamentary electors in England (36,995,157) divided by the existing number of seats (529), and requires the Commission to use the electorates as at the start of a review.

### **Procedures**

37. In conducting a general review of constituencies, the Commission are required by the legislation to follow certain procedures, principally to provide for public consultation.

38. The Home Secretary must be given notice of a review and that notice must be published in the London Gazette. Provisional recommendations must be published in newspapers in the affected constituencies and, unless the proposals are for no changes to be made, they must also be deposited

for public inspection in at least one place in each affected constituency. Representations may be made within one month of publication of the provisional recommendations and the Commission must take any representations into consideration. Where objections are received from a county or district council, or from a body of 100 or more electors, a local inquiry must be held.

39. If the Commission revise their recommendations as a result of an inquiry, the revised recommendations must also be published and further representations invited and considered. A second local inquiry cannot be forced by these further representations, but there is discretionary power to hold a second inquiry. Any further modifications, as a result of further representations or a second inquiry, must also be published and representations invited. When the Commission have decided their final recommendations for the whole country, they must submit a report to the Home Secretary.

### **Implementation of the recommendations**

40. The Home Secretary has a statutory duty to lay the Commission's report before Parliament together with a draft Order in Council giving effect to the Commission's recommendations with or without modifications. If modifications are proposed, the Home Secretary must also lay a statement of reasons for the modifications. The draft Order in Council is submitted to both Houses of Parliament for approval and, after it is made by Her Majesty in Council, it cannot be called into question in any legal proceedings. The new constituencies take effect at the general election following the making of the Order in Council.

41. The above information is intended to be a general guide only. For a definitive statement of the law, please refer to the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986, as amended by the Boundary Commissions Act 1992, the Local Government (Wales) Act 1994, the Government of Wales Act 1998, and the Scotland Act 1998, together with the Court of Appeal ruling in *R v Boundary Commission for England Ex parte Foot* [1983] QB 600.
