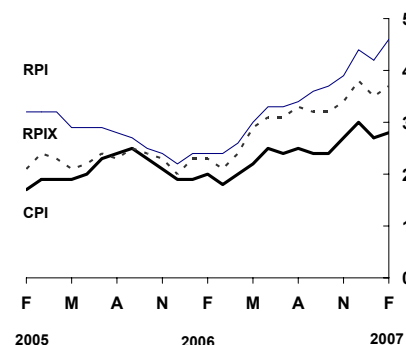

## Consumer price indices February 2007

In the year to February, the consumer prices index (CPI) rose by 2.8 per cent, up from 2.7 per cent in January.

In the year to February, the all items retail prices index (RPI) rose by 4.6 per cent, up from 4.2 per cent in January.

Over the same period, the all items RPI excluding mortgage interest payments index (RPIX) rose by 3.7 per cent, up from 3.5 per cent in January.

**Main contributions to the change in the 12-month rate<sup>1</sup>**

**CPI**

The largest upward effect on the CPI annual rate came from transport costs. There was a large upward contribution from air fares, particularly from flights to Europe, which experienced larger price increases in February than a year ago. Small upward contributions came from sea fares and motor vehicle purchase, both of which increased in price by more than a year ago. A large partially offsetting downward effect came from fuels and lubricants, where the average price recorded for petrol across February fell by around 0.6p per litre, compared with an increase of 0.5p per litre last February.

Another large upward contribution came from miscellaneous goods and services, where prices for personal care appliances increased in February by more than a year ago, with small contributions coming from a variety of items, and from insurance costs, where premiums rose this year but fell a year ago.

Further large upward contributions came from:

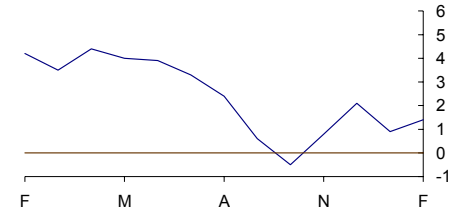
- Food and non-alcoholic beverages, where price increases for bread and cereals, meat, fish, fruit, vegetables and soft drinks were partially offset by price cuts for shop bought milk; and
- Furniture, household equipment and routine maintenance, where prices for furniture, furnishings and carpets recovered from January sales and generally rose by more than a year ago.

A small upward contribution to the change in the annual rate came from alcohol and tobacco, as prices increased in February compared with some reductions a year ago.

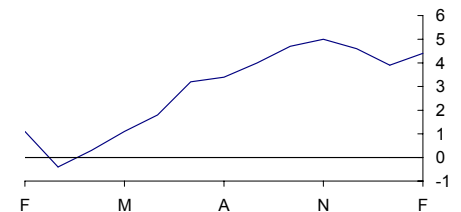
The largest downward effect on the CPI annual rate came from recreation and culture, due to price changes for games, toys and hobbies. Prices for computer games fell in February compared with large increases a year ago, with smaller effects from price cuts in children's toys. There was also a small downward effect from data processing equipment.

A small downward effect came from communication, mainly due to some reduced mobile phone tariffs available in February compared with little change a year ago, and mobile phone handsets, which showed little change in price this year but rose in February 2006.

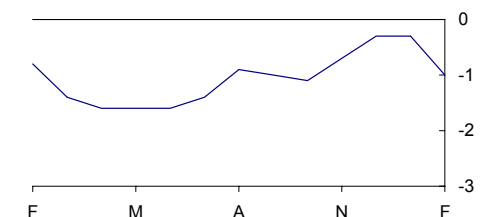
**Transport**

**RPI**

As in January, the largest upward contribution to the change in the RPI annual rate came from housing. There was a large upward effect from mortgage interest payments, with lenders who had not already done so passing on January's quarter point increase in the Bank rate. There was also a small upward contribution from depreciation, which rose this year by more than a year ago, reflecting movements in the smoothed house price index used to calculate this component. Both mortgage interest payments and depreciation are excluded from the CPI.

Further large upward contributions came from:

- Fares and other travel costs, where, as in the CPI, air fares increased in February, compared with an overall decrease last year;
- Food, where prices generally increased by more than a year ago with contributions from several sections; and
- Household goods, due to recoveries from January sales for furniture and furnishings.

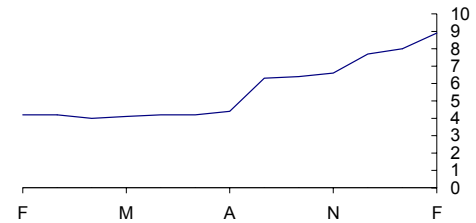
A small upward contribution to the change in the RPI annual rate came from alcoholic drink, where prices for off-sales increased in February but fell a year ago.

A large downward effect came from leisure goods, mainly due to computer games, which fell in price in February compared with large increases a year ago, and to a lesser extent, personal computers.

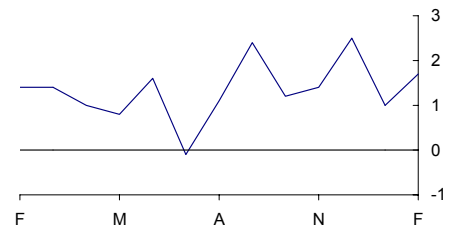
A small downward contribution to the change in the RPI annual rate came from fuel and light, largely due to average electricity tariffs increasing by less than a year ago.

Although motoring had no aggregate effect, a large downward contribution from cheaper petrol prices in February was offset by upward contributions from vehicle tax and insurance, where reductions in car insurance premiums last year were not repeated this February, and from purchase of motor vehicles, where car prices rose this year but fell a year ago.

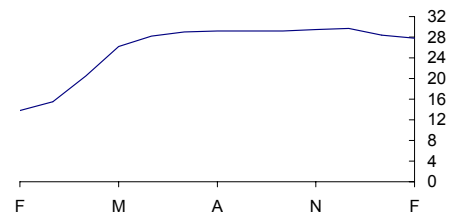
**Housing**  
RPI percentage changes over 12 months



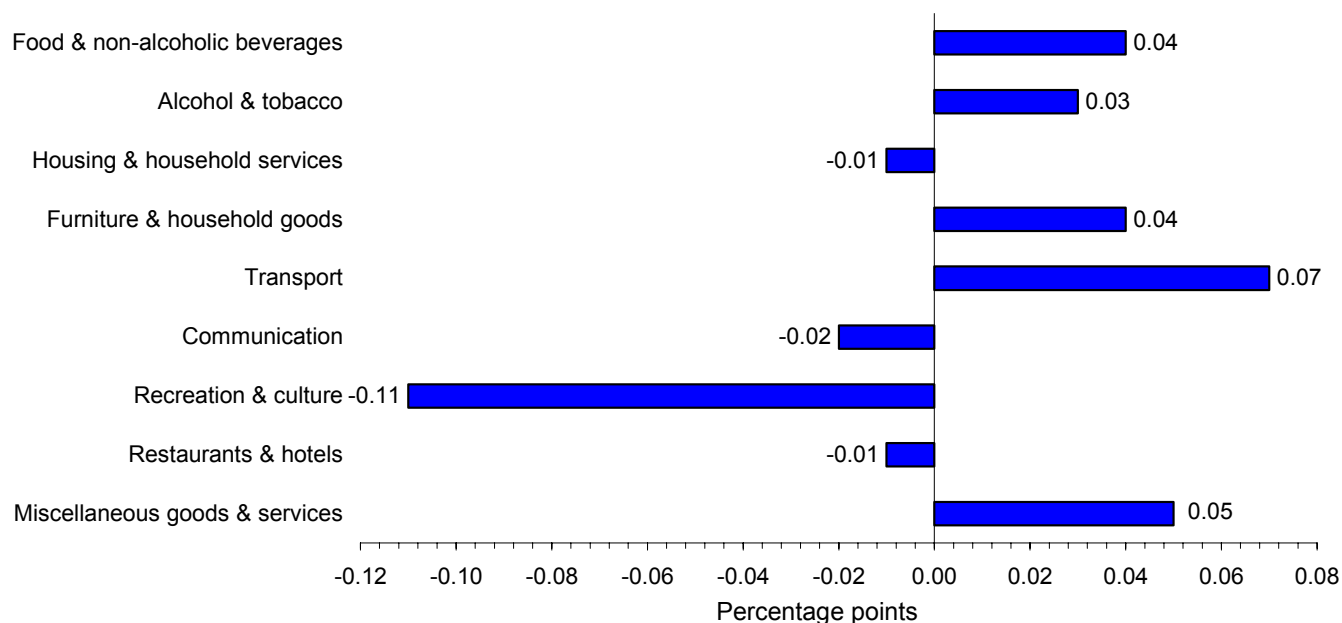
**Household goods**  
RPI percentage changes over 12 months



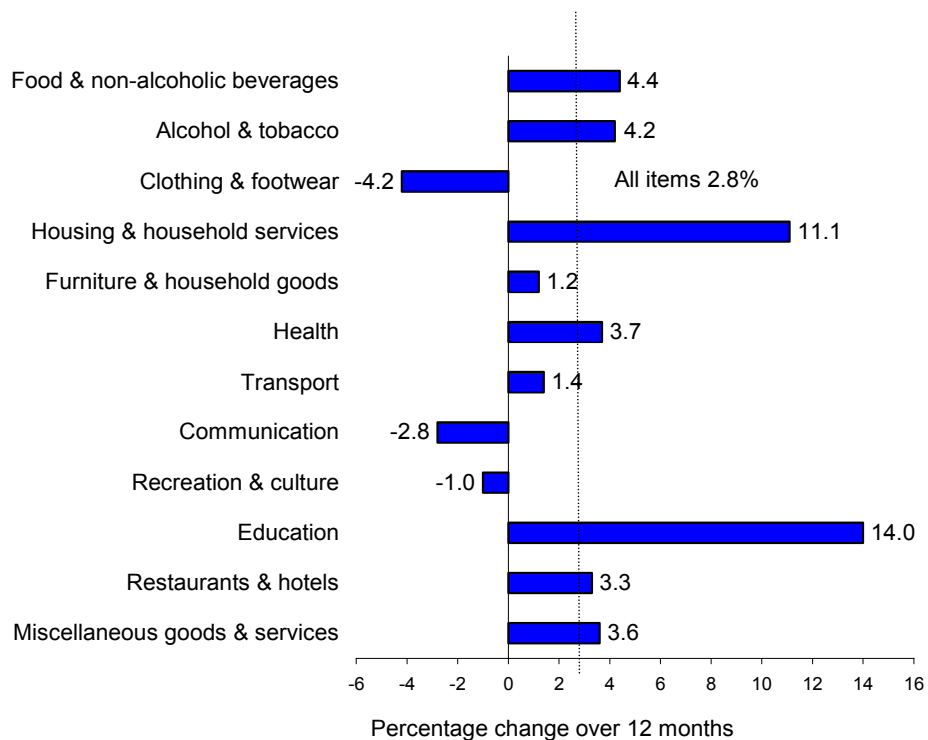
**Fuel and light**

**CPI main contributions<sup>1</sup> to the change in the all items 12-month rate between January 2007 and February 2007 (0.1 percentage points).**

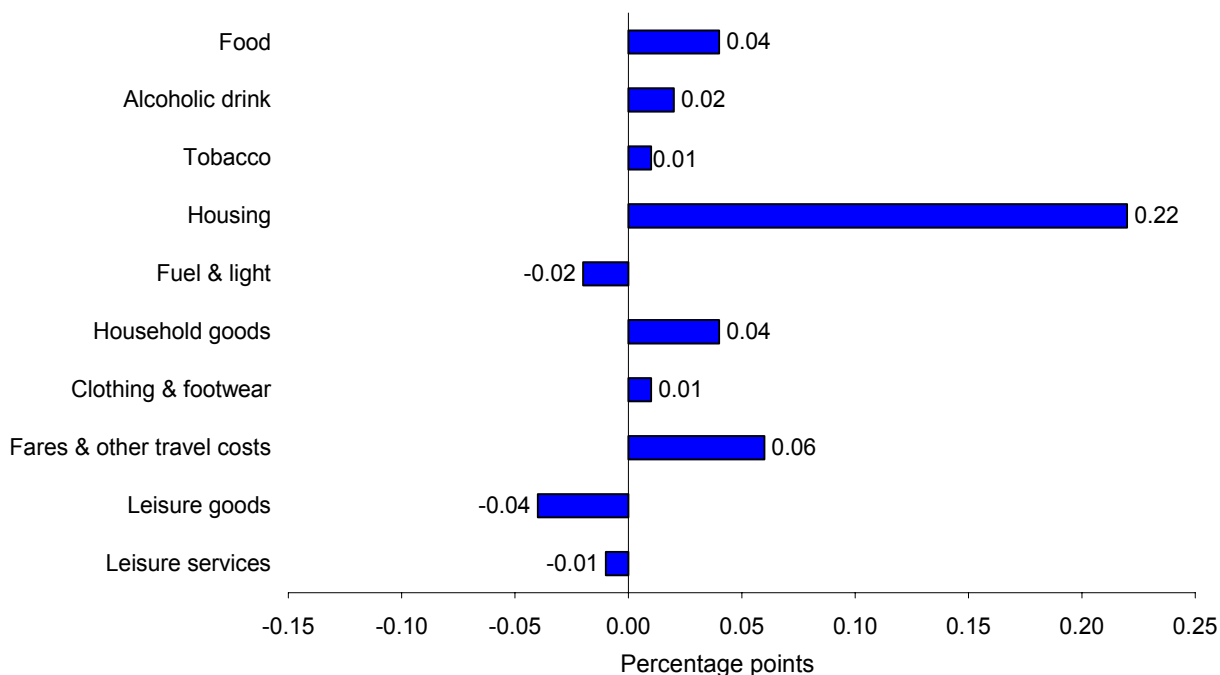


**CPI comparison of the 12-month percentage changes**

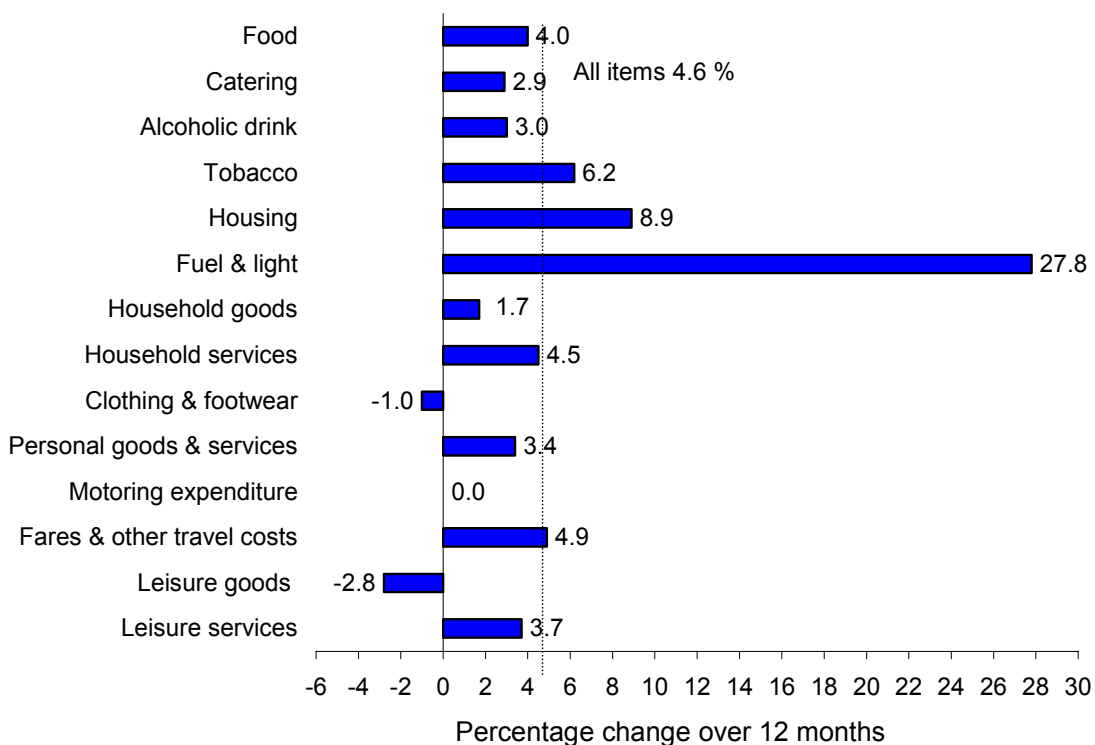

## BACKGROUND NOTES

### New this month

- 1 In line with usual practice, the February 2007 indices include updates to the published RPI weights, and updates to the unpublished CPI and RPI item weights. The basket of goods and services that are used to compile the CPI and RPI are reviewed annually. Changes to the basket this year, effective from the February indices, were described in an article published on the National Statistics website on Monday 19 March; see background note 6.

### Relevance

2. The consumer prices index (CPI) is the main United Kingdom domestic measure of consumer price inflation for macroeconomic purposes. It forms the basis for the Government's inflation target that the Bank of England's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) is required to achieve.
3. Internationally, the CPI is known as the Harmonised Index of Consumer Prices (HICP). HICPs are calculated in each Member State of the European Union, according to rules specified in a series of European Regulations developed by Eurostat in conjunction with the EU Member States. HICPs are used to compare inflation rates across the European Union. Since January 1999 it has also been used by the European Central Bank (ECB) as the measure of price stability across the euro area.
4. The retail prices index (RPI) is the most long-standing general purpose measure of inflation in the United Kingdom and is available from June 1947. It is used for a variety of purposes by both government and external users including the indexation of various incomes and prices and the uprating of pensions, benefits and index-linked gilts.

### Methodology

5. The CPI and the RPI are compiled using the same underlying price data, based on a large and representative selection of around 650 individual goods and services for which price movements are measured in around 150 randomly selected areas throughout the UK. Around 120,000 separate price quotations are used every month to compile the indices. The outlets in which the prices are collected are selected randomly. Expenditure weights are held constant for one year at a time.
6. The selection of goods and services that are priced to compile the CPI and RPI is reviewed annually. The contents of the 2007 basket are described in an article published on the National Statistics website at:

7. Rates of change for the CPI are calculated from unrounded index levels, rather than on the published indices, which are rounded to one decimal place. The use of unrounded indices increases the accuracy of the calculation. The unrounded index levels are available on request. By contrast, rates of change for the RPI are calculated from the published rounded indices.

### Reliability

8. Once the RPI indices are published they are never revised. CPI indices are revisable although past revisions have been minimal with the exception of those arising from re-referencing of the CPI to 2005=100, which took place with the publication of the January 2006 indices.

### Comparability

9. The CPI's coverage of goods and services was extended in stages in the areas of health, education, childcare and insurance, with effect from the January 2000, 2001, and 2002 indices. In 2000, there was also a change to the population basis for the weights which was broadened from private households to include expenditure by foreign visitors and residents of institutional households. 10. The official CPI series starts in 1996 but estimates for earlier periods are available back to 1988. These estimates are broadly consistent with data from 1996 but should be treated with some caution. The following article provides more detail:

### Coherence

12. The CPI and RPI both measure the average change from month to month in the prices of consumer goods and services purchased in the UK. However, they differ in both coverage and methodology. A detailed description of these differences is given in an article entitled "The New Inflation Target: the Statistical Perspective":

  - In the CPI, the geometric mean is used to combine the individual prices into elementary indices at the most basic level whereas the RPI uses arithmetic means.
  - The CPI excludes a number of RPI series mainly relating to housing costs (for example, council tax), and in particular to owner occupiers' housing costs (including mortgage interest payments, house depreciation and buildings insurance). In addition, the CPI excludes the annual road fund licence and, from 2006, TV licences which are classified as taxes in the UK National Accounts, and Trades Union subscriptions which by convention are not part of household expenditure.
  - The CPI includes series for university accommodation fees, foreign students' university tuition fees, and unit trust and stockbrokers' charges, none of which are included in the RPI.

- The CPI is categorised according to the international classification system, COICOP (Classification Of Individual CONsumption by Purpose). The way in which this maps to the RPI groupings is shown in the following table:

- The index for the purchase of new cars in the CPI is quality adjusted and based on actual published prices for new cars. New car prices in the RPI are imputed from movements in second hand car prices.
- The CPI weights are based on expenditure by all private households, foreign visitors to the UK and residents of institutional households. In the RPI, weights are based on expenditure by private households only, excluding the highest income households and pensioner households mainly dependent on state benefits.
- In the construction of the CPI weights, amounts paid out in insurance claims are distributed among the COICOP headings according to the nature of the claims' expenditure, with the residual (the service charge) being allocated to the relevant insurance heading. For the RPI weights, total expenditure (that is, gross of claims paid out) is assigned to the relevant insurance heading.

13. A breakdown of the difference between the CPI and RPI annual rates of inflation is shown in Table 10 of the CPI First Release.

#### **Accessibility**

14. This release includes the February 2007 data, collected on 13 February. Future publication dates are 17 April, 15 May, 12 June, 17 July, 14 August and 18 September. The European Commission (Eurostat) released figures for the harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP) for the month of February 2007 for EU member states, together with an EU average, on 15 March 2007.

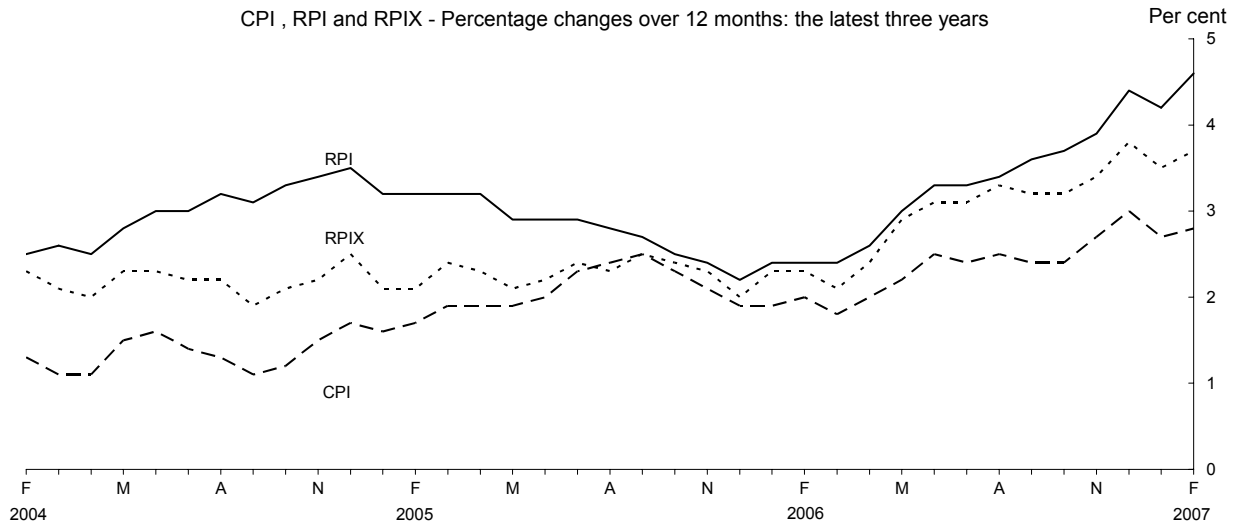

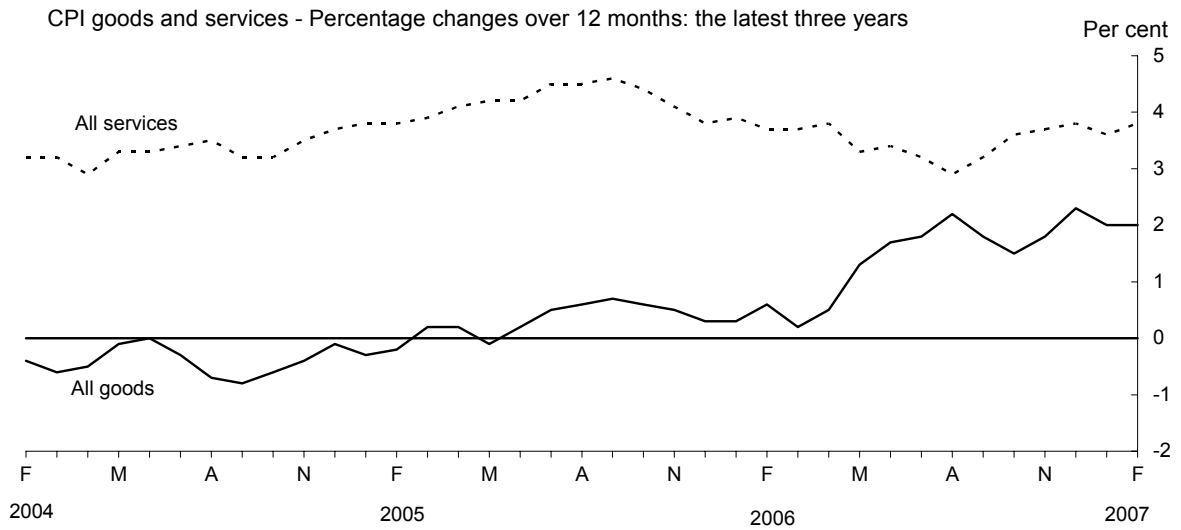
