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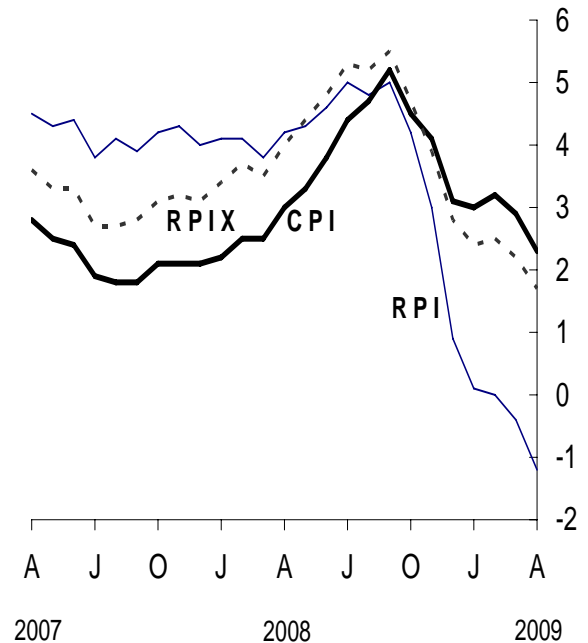

Consumer price indices April 2009

In the year to April, the consumer prices index (CPI) rose by 2.3 per cent, down from 2.9 per cent in March.

In the year to April, the all items retail prices index (RPI) fell by 1.2 per cent, compared with a fall of 0.4 per cent in March.

Over the same period, the all items RPI excluding mortgage interest payments index (RPIX) rose by 1.7 per cent, down from 2.2 per cent in March.

Main contributions to the change in the CPI 12-month rate¹

The largest downward contribution to the change in the CPI annual rate came from housing and household services. The effect came from electricity bills and, to a lesser extent, gas bills. Tariffs for both fell this year but rose a year ago. There were also downward effects from housing rents and water and sewerage, with charges rising by less than a year ago.

There was also a large downward contribution from food and non-alcoholic beverages. There were large downward effects from vegetables and meat with prices falling this year but rising a year ago. There were small downward effects from fruit, 'bread and cereals' and 'sugar and confectionery'.

Further large downward contributions came from:

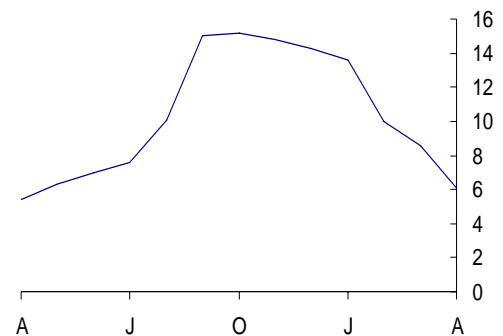
- Alcoholic beverages and tobacco where prices rose last year, mainly reflecting an increase in excise duty, whereas this year's rise in excise duty takes effect a month later
- Restaurants and hotels where prices rose by less than a year ago. Last year's price rise was partly due to an increase in excise duty on alcohol
- Miscellaneous goods and services where mortgage arrangement fees fell this year but rose a year ago. There were also downward effects from items for personal care (e.g. toilet rolls) and home delivery charges. There was a partially offsetting effect from insurance costs which rose by more than a year ago
- Recreation and culture, principally due to games, toys and hobbies where prices fell this year but rose a year ago, particularly for computer games. There was a small partially offsetting effect from audio visual equipment, cultural services, including admissions to cultural events (e.g. zoos), and cable TV subscriptions

There was a large upward contribution from transport costs due to purchase of vehicles, 'fuels and lubricants' and air transport. Car prices rose this year but were little changed a year ago, principally due to the price of second-hand cars. The price of fuels and lubricants rose by more than a year ago. The average price of petrol rose by 4.0 pence per litre between March and April this year, to stand at 94.4 pence, compared with a rise of 1.9 pence last year. This year's price rise incorporates an increase in excise duty which took effect from 1 April.

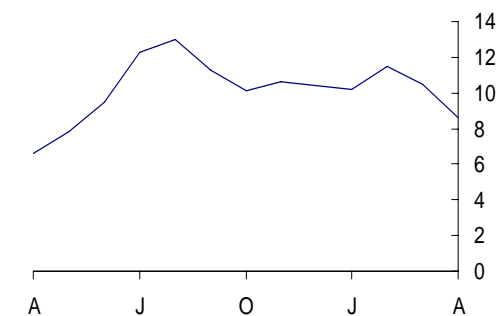
There was also a large upward contribution from communication, principally from telephone equipment and services. Landline telephone charges rose by more than a year ago and the price of mobile phone handsets rose this year but fell a year ago.

There was a small upward contribution from clothing and footwear where the price of clothing rose this year but fell a year ago.

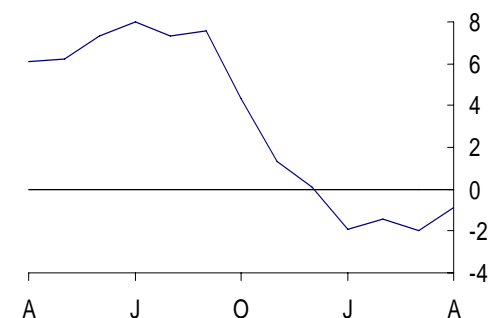
Housing and household services

Main contributions to the change in the RPI 12-month rate

The largest downward contribution to the change in the RPI annual rate came from housing where the largest effect came from mortgage interest payments following March's half point decrease in the Bank rate from 1.0 per cent to 0.5 per cent. There were also downward effects from house depreciation, rent, council tax and dwelling insurance.

There was also a large downward contribution from fuel and light. The effect came from electricity bills and, to a lesser extent, gas bills. Tariffs for both fell this year but rose a year ago. There was also a small effect from heating oil where prices rose by less than last year.

There were further large downward contributions from:

- Food where prices fell this year but rose a year ago. There were downward effects from fresh vegetables, fresh fruit, beef and dried potted snacks
- Alcoholic drinks where prices rose by less than a year ago. Last year's price rise mainly reflected an increase in excise duty whereas this year's rise in excise duty takes effect a month later
- Tobacco where prices rose last year, mainly reflecting an increase in excise duty whereas this year's rise in excise duty takes effect a month later

There was a small downward contribution from catering where the price of restaurant meals rose by less than a year ago.

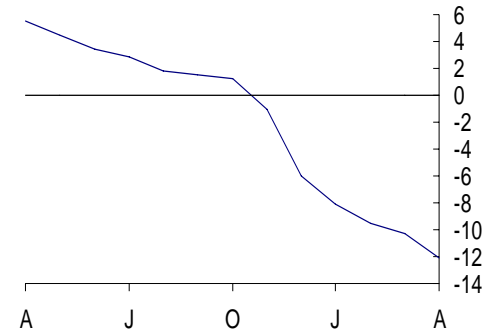
The largest upward contribution to the change in the RPI annual rate came from motoring expenditure due to purchase of vehicles, 'petrol and oil' and, to a lesser extent, vehicle tax and insurance. Car prices rose this year but were little changed a year ago. The price of petrol and oil rose by more than a year ago. The average price of petrol rose by 4.4 pence per litre between March and April this year, to stand at 94.6 pence, compared with a rise of 1.2 pence last year. This year's price rise incorporates an increase in excise duty which took effect from 1 April.

There was also a large upward contribution from household services principally due to landline telephone charges which rose by more than last year.

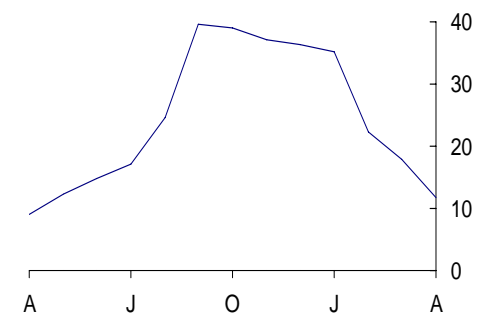
There was a small upward contribution from household goods, principally due to furniture where, overall, prices fell by less than a year ago. There was a partially offsetting effect from furnishings, particularly carpets, with prices falling this year but rising a year ago.

There was also a small upward effect from fares and other travel principally due to air fares which fell by less than a year ago.

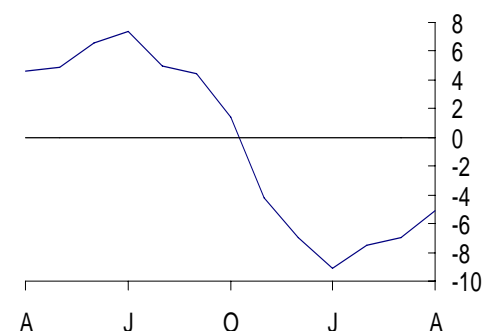
Housing
RPI percentage changes over 12 months



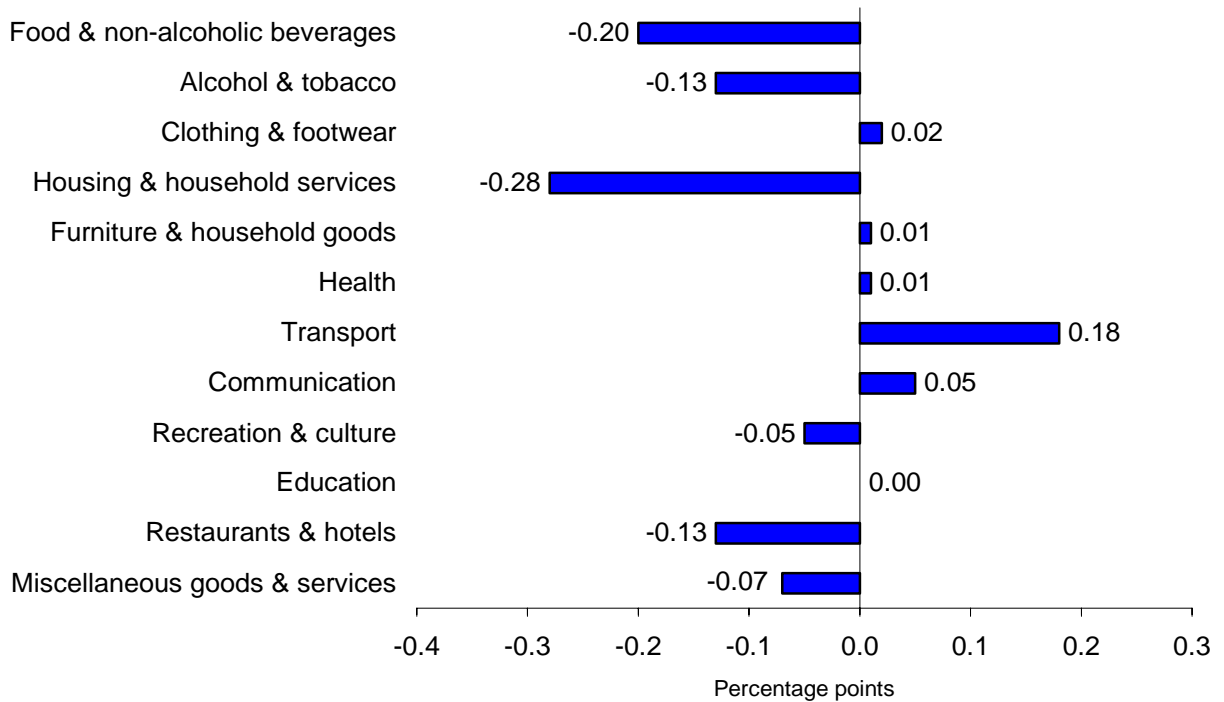
Fuel and light
RPI percentage changes over 12 months



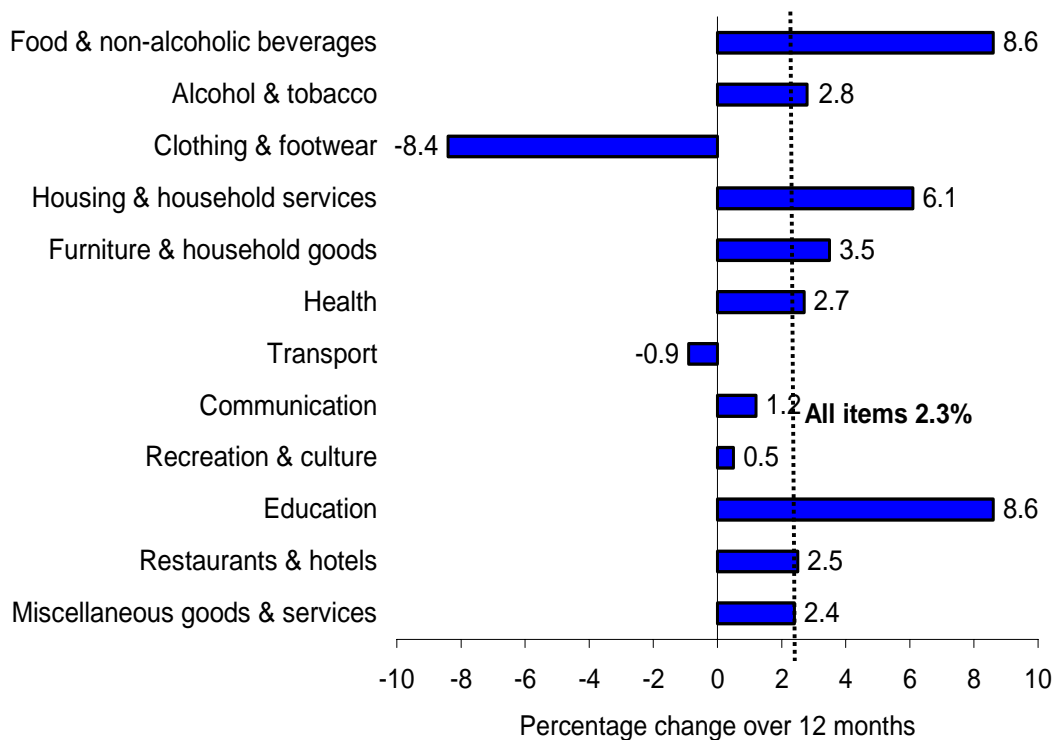
Motoring expenditure

CPI main contributions¹ to the change in the all items 12-month rate between March 2009 and April 2009 (-0.6 percentage points)

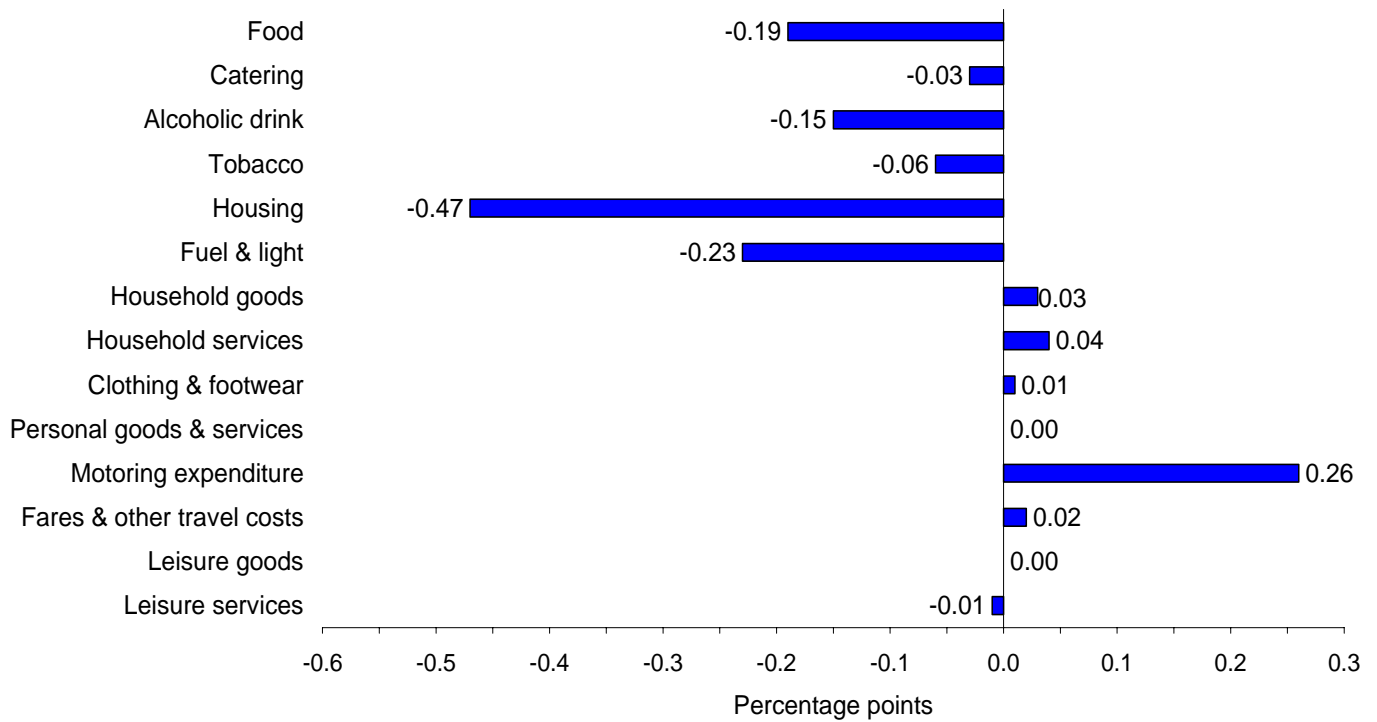


CPI comparison of the 12-month percentage changes

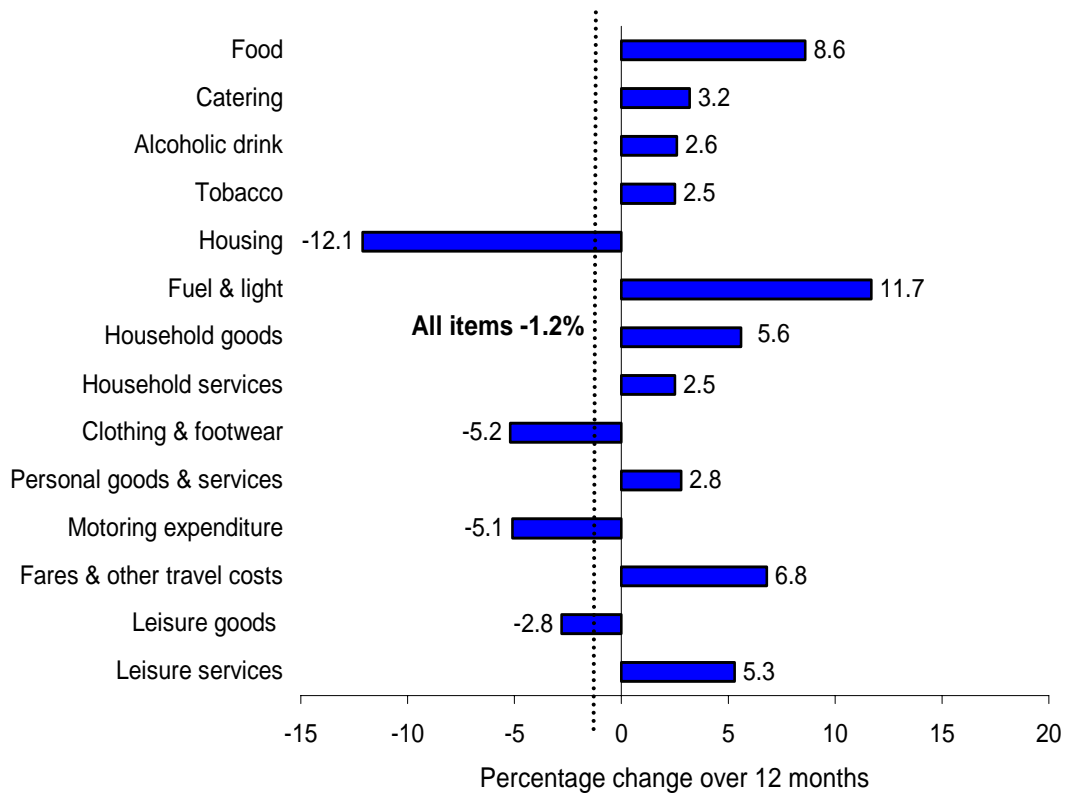

RPI main contributions¹ to the change in the all items 12-month rate between March 2009 and April 2009 (-0.8 percentage points)

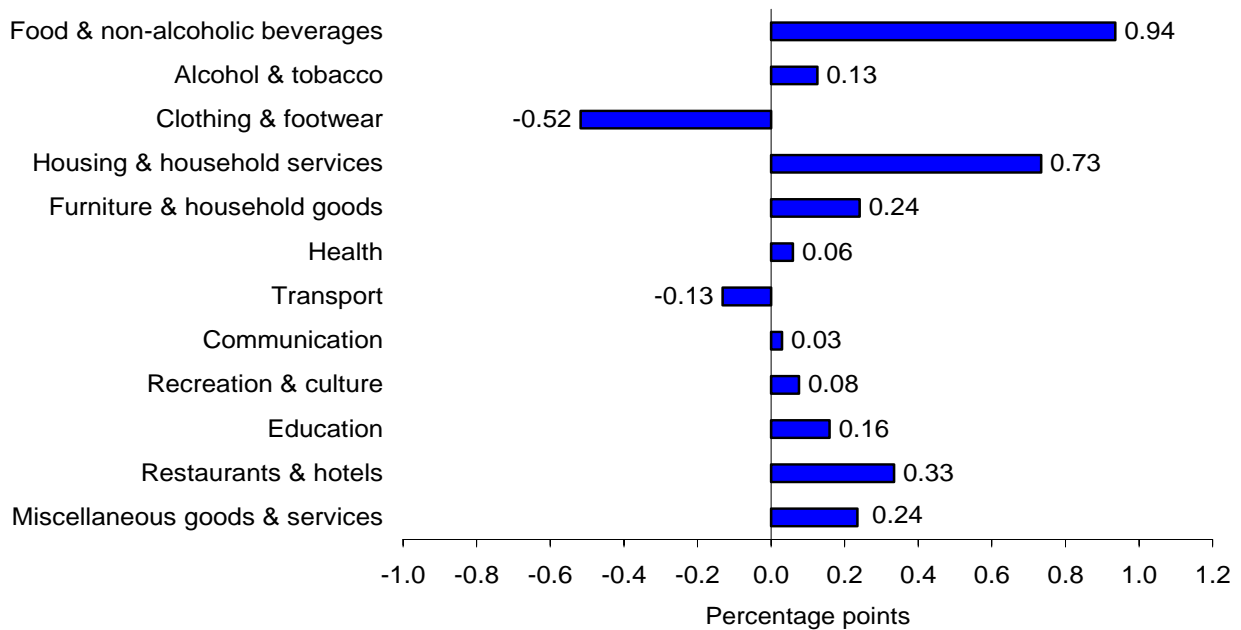


RPI comparison of the 12-month percentage changes

The largest contribution to the 2.3 per cent 12-month rate came from food and non-alcoholic beverages. Overall prices rose by 8.6 per cent with the largest rises recorded against meat, coffee, tea and vegetables.

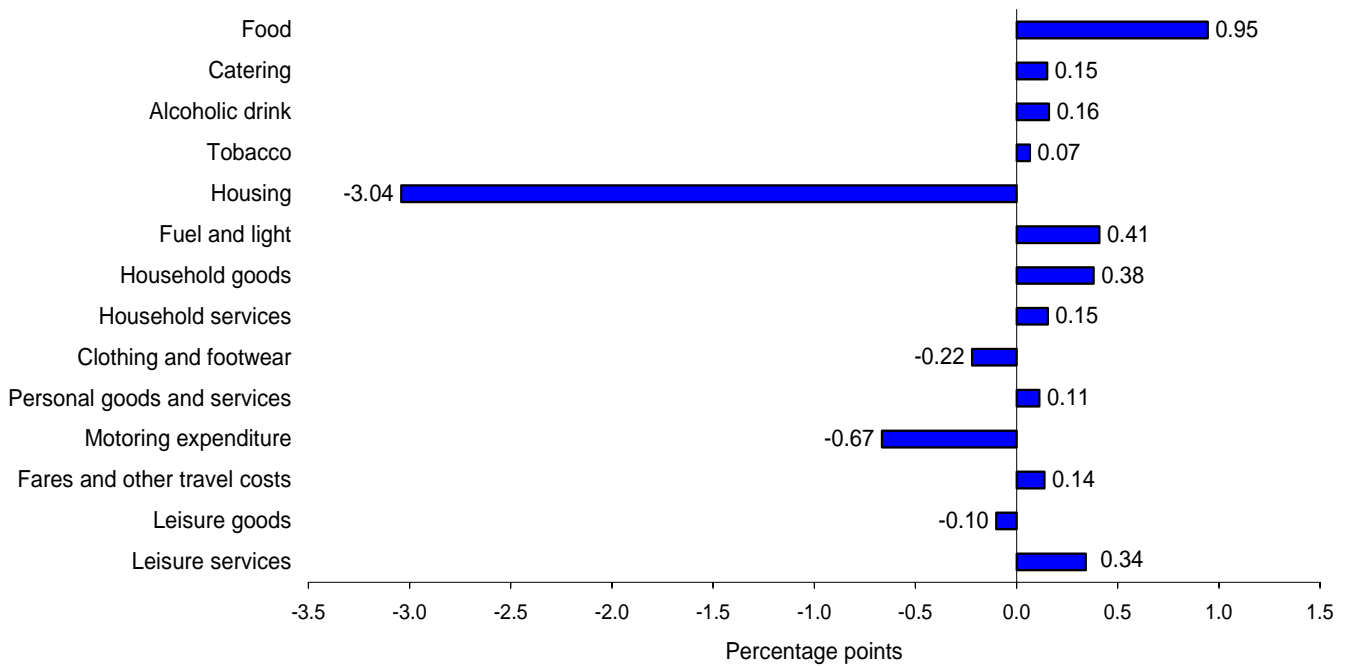
Housing and household services contributed 0.7 percentage points, principally from electricity and gas. Gas prices have risen by 23.5 per cent over the year and electricity prices have risen by 9.1 per cent.

Restaurants and hotels contributed 0.3 percentage points to the 12-month rate. Overall, prices rose by 2.5 per cent with the largest rise of 3.0 per cent recorded against restaurants and cafes.

In contrast, prices of clothing and footwear fell by 8.4 per cent over the 12 months to April and this had a downward pull of 0.5 percentage points on the rate.

The largest downward contribution to the 12-month rate came from housing which had a downward pull of 3.0 percentage points. Overall, prices fell by 12.1 per cent on the year with the main contributions coming from mortgage interest payments and house depreciation.

Motoring also had a downward pull of 0.7 percentage points on the 12-month rate. Overall, prices fell by 5.1 per cent over the year due to falls in the prices of motor vehicles and petrol and oil.

The largest upward contribution to the 12-month rate came from food which contributed 1.0 percentage points. Overall prices rose by 8.6 per cent with the higher price rises recorded against lamb, beef, processed fish, pork, processed fruit, tea, coffee, sugar and vegetables.

Fuel and light contributed 0.4 percentage points with the largest effects coming from increases in gas and electricity tariffs, where prices rose by 24.0 per cent and 9.1 per cent respectively.

BACKGROUND NOTES

Relevance

1. The consumer prices index (CPI) is the main United Kingdom domestic measure of consumer price inflation for macroeconomic purposes. It forms the basis for the Government's inflation target that the Bank of England's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) is required to achieve.
2. Internationally, the CPI is known as the Harmonised Index of Consumer Prices (HICP). HICPs are calculated in each Member State of the European Union, according to rules specified in a series of European Regulations developed by Eurostat in conjunction with the EU Member States. HICPs are used to compare inflation rates across the European Union. Since January 1999 it has also been used by the European Central Bank (ECB) as the measure of price stability across the euro area.
3. The retail prices index (RPI) is the most long-standing general purpose measure of inflation in the United Kingdom and is available from June 1947. It is used for a variety of purposes by both government and external users including the indexation of various incomes and prices and the uprating of pensions, benefits and index-linked gilts.

Methodology

4. The CPI and the RPI are compiled using the same underlying price data, based on a large and representative selection of around 650 individual goods and services for which price movements are measured in around 150 randomly selected areas throughout the UK. Around 120,000 separate price quotations are used every month to compile the indices. The outlets in which the prices are collected are selected randomly. Expenditure weights are held constant for one year at a time.
5. The selection of goods and services that are priced to compile the CPI and RPI is reviewed annually. The contents of the 2009 basket are described in an article published on the National Statistics website at:

6. Rates of change for the CPI are calculated from unrounded index levels, rather than from the published indices, which are rounded to one decimal place. The use of unrounded indices increases the accuracy of the calculation. The unrounded index levels are available on request. By contrast, rates of change for the RPI are calculated from the published rounded indices.

Reliability

7. Once the RPI indices are published they are never revised. CPI indices are revisable although past revisions have been minimal with the exception of those arising from re-referencing of the CPI to 2005=100, which took place with the publication of the January 2006 indices.

Comparability

8. The CPI's coverage of goods and services was extended in stages in the areas of health, education, childcare and insurance, with effect from the January 2000, 2001, and 2002 indices. In 2000, there was also a change to the population basis for the weights which was broadened from private households to include expenditure by foreign visitors and residents of institutional households. 9. The official CPI series starts in 1996 but estimates for earlier periods are available back to 1988. 10. RPI data are available back to 1947 but have been re-referenced on several occasions since then, generally accompanied by changes to the coverage and/or structure of the detailed sub-components. Coherence

11. The CPI and RPI both measure the average change from month to month in the prices of consumer goods and services purchased in the UK. However, they differ in both coverage and methodology. A detailed description of these differences is given in an article entitled "The New Inflation Target: the Statistical Perspective": www.statistics.gov.uk/StatBase/Product.asp?vlnk=10913. The differences are summarised below:
 - In the CPI, the geometric mean is used to combine the individual prices into elementary indices at the most basic level whereas the RPI uses arithmetic means
 - The CPI excludes a number of RPI series mainly relating to housing costs (for example, council tax), and in particular to owner occupiers' housing costs (including mortgage interest payments, house depreciation and buildings insurance). In addition, the CPI excludes the annual road fund licence and, from 2006, TV licences which are classified as taxes in the UK National Accounts, and Trades Union subscriptions which by convention are not part of household expenditure

- The CPI includes series for university accommodation fees, foreign students' university tuition fees, and unit trust and stockbrokers' charges, none of which are included in the RPI
- The CPI is categorised according to the international classification system, COICOP (Classification Of Individual Consumption by Purpose). The way in which this maps to the RPI groupings is shown in the following table:

- The index for the purchase of new cars in the CPI is quality adjusted and based on actual published prices for new cars. New car prices in the RPI are imputed from movements in second hand car prices
- The CPI weights are based on expenditure by all private households, foreign visitors to the UK and residents of institutional households. In

the RPI, weights are based on expenditure by private households only, excluding the highest income households and pensioner households mainly dependent on state benefits

- In the construction of the CPI weights, amounts paid out in insurance claims are distributed among the COICOP headings according to the nature of the claims' expenditure, with the residual (the service charge) being allocated to the relevant insurance heading. For the RPI weights, total expenditure (that is, gross of claims paid out) is assigned to the relevant insurance heading

12. A breakdown of the difference between the CPI and RPI annual rates of inflation is shown in Table 10 of the CPI First Release.

Accessibility

13. This release includes the April 2009 data, collected on 21 April 2009. Future publication dates are 16 June, 14 July, 18 August, 15 September, 13 October, 17 November and 15 December. The European Commission (Eurostat) released figures for the harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP) for the month of April 2009 for EU member states excluding the UK, together with an EU average, on 15 May 2009.
